## Building Your Vocabulary



## Outcomes:

4.4: Develop some independence in recognizing and using various reading and viewing strategies (predicting, questioning, etc.) and in using cueing systems (graphophonic, contextual, syntactic, etc.) to construct meaning; apply and develop these strategies and systems while reading and viewing increasingly complex print and media texts
4.5: Talk and write about the various processes and strategies readers and viewers apply when constructing meaning from various texts; recognize and articulate personal processes and strategies used when reading or viewing various texts

Developing a vocabulary is largely achieved through repeated exposure to unfamiliar words in context. The more you read, the more new words you encounter. The more new words you encounter, the more new words you learn. It's not a coincidence that the individuals who read the most are usually the individuals with the broadest vocabularies. Vocabulary development begins in infancy by listening to those around you and continues to develop through reading a wide variety of genres.

As the term progresses keep track of the new words you meet when you are reading (example provided on the following page). You may need to use a dictionary. However, sometimes the context is strong and you will learn the word instantly.
